 The 2023-24 report is the 17th National Compliance and Enforcement Report to be published.

 Its compilation was initiated in conjunction with inception of operations of the Environmental Management Inspectorate in 2006/7.


• The national report is the **main communication mechanism** that informs external stakeholders about the work of the Inspectorate in the preceding financial year.

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General Trends


- There has been a **6%** (**3215 to 3404**) increase in the number of Environmental Management Inspectors (EMIs) at national, provincial and local spheres of government.
- A general decrease in criminal enforcement activities in 23/24 as compared to 22/23 (AOG fines, dockets, arrests and convictions).
- An 8% (1229 to 1327) increase in the issuance of administrative enforcement notices.
- The **number of facilities inspected** rose significantly from 4432 in 22/23 to 5643 in 23/24 **(30%**).
- The reported number of reactive inspections conducted in 23/24 more than doubled as compared to amounted to 22/23 (1107 to 2467)








Plea and Sentencing agreements



Total value of admission of guilt fines paid has decreased from 2022/23 to 2023/24










Number of Facilities that were inspected increased

5 643 inspections were initiated by the following triggers:


Proactive Reactive Inspections



There was a 15% increase in the number of inspection reports finalised compared to the 2022/23 reporting year




Overall National Compliance Statistics

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Most prevalent types of environmental crimes

- Illegal possession and hunting of protected fauna/flora, illegal entry into protected area = 1090 non-compliances reported
- Unlawful commencement of Environmental Impact Assessment Listed/Specified Activity = 807 non-compliances reported



Number of new pieces of subordinate legislation added to mandate of EMIs in 23/24




The growth in environmental legislation / legal requirements is not matched by a corresponding increase in EMI capacity to implement



Strategic EMI Projects/Operations (Municipal Landfill Sites)

- A total of 357 sites have been monitored for compliance over the period of 5 years.
- Monitoring includes baseline inspections, follow-up on action plans and commitments made in response to enforcement action.
- To date, a total of 52 criminal cases have been opened against municipalities for non-compliant landfill sites
- Despite the interventions made thus far, the status of compliance has not improved with only 19% (67) of the 357 inspected sites found to be compliant.



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Strategic EMI Projects/Operations (Ocean and Marine Crime Priority Committee (Initiative 5): Enhanced and Coordinated Compliance and Enforcement)

Operations focused on:

- The mitigation of illegal harvesting of marine resources;
- Marine Protected Areas (MPA's) infringements and other environmental priorities;
- Contraventions of maritime safety legislation;
- Illicit economy, illegal, unreported, and unregulated (IUU) fishing;

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EMI Capacity Development Programme 23/24:

During 2023/24, a total of **596 EMIs and other regulatory authorities** received training as follows:

- 151 officials attended EMI basic training
- 315 EMIs attended EMI specialized training (docket management, wetlands, self-defence, sampling and SA BOLD)
- 118 external regulatory authorities (BMA, SARS, NPA and Judiciary)
- 15 EMIs received Grade 5 train-the-trainer training







Conclusion

- Whilst the number of criminal enforcement activities decreased in the year under review, we are seeing more impactful sentences
- Intensified monitoring underscores a stronger culture of accountability and environmental stewardship and indicates focused attention on reported noncompliance incidents
- Pervasive issues must still be addressed untreated sewage discharge to land, freshwater, and coastal areas; pollution impacting air quality; illegal activities associate with waste management & disposal and ecosystem degradation resulting from invasive species
- Environmental compliance and enforcement authorities must be innovative, focusing resources on the country's most urgent environmental threats the Lekgotla provides the platform to focus the strength of the combined EMI network to address these issues
