1.5 Failure on the part of a tenderer to submit proof or documentation required in terms of this tender to claim points for specific goals with the tender, will be interpreted to mean that preference points for specific goals are not claimed.

1.6 The organ of state reserves the right to require of a tenderer, either before a tender is adjudicated or at any time subsequently, to substantiate any claim in regard to preferences, in any manner required by the organ of state.

2. **DEFINITIONS**

- (a) **"tender"** means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation to provide goods or services through price quotations, competitive tendering process or any other method envisaged in legislation;
- (b) "**price**" means an amount of money tendered for goods or services, and includes all applicable taxes less all unconditional discounts;
- (c) "rand value" means the total estimated value of a contract in Rand, calculated at the time of bid invitation, and includes all applicable taxes;
- (d) "tender for income-generating contracts" means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation for the origination of income-generating contracts through any method envisaged in legislation that will result in a legal agreement between the organ of state and a third party that produces revenue for the organ of state, and includes, but is not limited to, leasing and disposal of assets and concession contracts, excluding direct sales and disposal of assets through public auctions; and

4. POINTS AWARDED FOR SPECIFIC GOALS

- 4.1. In terms of Regulation 4(2); 5(2); 6(2) and 7(2) of the Preferential Procurement Regulations, preference points must be awarded for specific goals stated in the tender. For the purposes of this tender the tenderer will be allocated points based on the goals stated in table 1 below as may be supported by proof/ documentation stated in the conditions of this tender:

1. PURPOSE

1.1 To appoint a service provider to compile an inventory of chemicals in products, identify hazards and associated risks, and develop a management action plan for South Africa on children's products: shoes (0 to 12 years), pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, teething toys, bath toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics for a period of twenty-four (24) months.

2. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

- 2.1. The transparency of information about chemicals in global supply chains has been an emerging policy issue for the Strategic Approach to International Chemicals Management (SAICM) since 2009, leading to programmes such as the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) Chemicals in Products (CIPs). The goal of the UNEP is to enable stakeholders to have greater access to the information on CIPs that they need so that they make informed decisions and take appropriate action on chemical hazards, exposure, risks, and management. In recent years it has become increasingly evident that information on the CIPs is too often absent or insufficient to allow proper management. Furthermore, systems for the production, distribution, use, and treatment of discarded products are increasingly cross-border to an extent.
- 2.2. Most chemicals are used to manufacture products that are relatively safe when used and handled appropriately. Some products, however, contain chemicals that can present significant risks to the environment and human health at various points in the product's lifecycle and value chain. Product manufacturers, transporters, retailers, consumers and users, recyclers, and waste managers require adequate information on hazardous chemicals in products to make informed choices, avoid and minimise exposure, and protect the environment and human health when using and handling these chemicals.
- 2.3. Data, information, knowledge, and management of the use and handling of chemicals, including those in products, are critical to the protection of the environment and human health. Environmentally sound management of chemicals throughout their lifecycle and value chain contributes towards the achievement of the goal of SAICM of avoiding significant negative impacts from chemicals on the environment and human health.
- 2.4. Access to data, information, and awareness of chemicals and products should equip companies and customers to prefer and select inherently safer alternatives, selections that make possible achieving the goal of SAICM.

3. OBJECTIVES

- 3.1. The project is limited to children's products: shoes (0 to 12 years), pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, teething toys, bath toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics. The objectives of the project are to:
 - 3.1.1 Compile an inventory of the following Chemicals in the above-mentioned Products.

 - 3.1.4 Sample and test shoes (0 to 12 years), pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, teething toys, bath toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics in SANAS-accredited labs for chemicals mentioned in 3.1.1.
 - 3.1.5 Facilitate the input from different stakeholders from government, communities, industries, nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) and others.
 - 3.1.6 Develop a Management Action Plan for South Africa.
 - 3.1.7 Prepare awareness-raising material and propose an innovative awareness campaign(s)

4. SCOPE AND EXTENT OF WORK

- 4.1 The appointed service provider will compile an inventory of Chemicals in Products (CIPs), identify hazards and Associated Risks, and develop a Management Action Plan for South Africa. The study will cover, amongst others, the children's toys, and baby products: i.e. shoes, pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, bath toys, teething toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics.
 - 4.1.1. Develop a list of Chemical in Products:
 - Chemical name, trade names, Chemical Abstract Service registry (CAS) number, Harmonized System (HS) international codes, unique custom tariff codes for Lead (Pb); Cadmium (Cd); Phthalates; Brominated Flame Retardants (BFRs); Azo dyes (certain dyes); Bisphenol A (BPA) in children's toys, and baby products: i.e. shoes, pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, bath toys, teething toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics.

- Identify the following chemicals: Lead (Pb); Cadmium (Cd); Phthalates; Brominated Flame Retardants (BFRs); Azo dyes (certain dyes); Bisphenol A (BPA) in children's toys, and baby products: i.e. shoes, pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, bath toys, teething toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics.
- Sample and test for Lead (Pb); Cadmium (Cd); Phthalates; Brominated Flame Retardants (BFRs); Azo dyes (certain dyes); Bisphenol A (BPA) in children's toys, and baby products: i.e. shoes, pacifiers (dummies), feeding bottles, bath toys, teething toys, nappies, and baby cosmetics in SANAS accredited laboratory.
- The usage or the application of the chemicals in the above-mentioned products, including the name of the manufacturer, importer, distributor, and the country of export.
- Chemical status in the country:
 - Restricted, banned, or prohibited, when and by which legislation?
 - How are they regulated in the country and by which entity?
 - Still in use? If yes, elaborate on the use.
- Quantities of imports and exports, usage in kg, tonnages, or litres

4.1.2 Identify hazards and associated risks.

- Toxicity and possible environmental and human health impacts
- Indicate the chemical's intrinsic characteristics such as persistence, bio-accumulative, biomagnification, toxic, carcinogenic, and mutagenic, adversely affect the human reproductive system, endocrine system, immune system, and central nervous system.
- Identify the vulnerable groups with the highest exposure.
- Predict damage to all environmental media and human exposure throughout the lifecycle and value chain.
- 4.1.3 Identify alternatives that are safer, affordable, effective, accessible, technologically relevant, and environmentally sound for those chemicals identified in products.
- 4.1.4 The identification of alternatives should be done taking into consideration the different industrial processes, the possible socio-economic impacts of introducing such alternatives in such processes, the cost-effectiveness of the alternatives, and South Africa's status as a developing country.
- 4.1.5 Facilitate the input from different stakeholders from government, communities, industries, NGOs, civil society, and others.
 - Present and participate in stakeholder engagement workshops.
 - Compile the comments and response report.

- 4.1.6 Develop a Management Action Plan for South Africa taking into consideration the possible socio-economic impacts, existing policies and legal framework, and South Africa's status as a developing country.
- 4.1.7 Prepare awareness-raising material and propose an innovative awareness campaign(s) in appropriate languages by making full use of, among other things, the media, and hazard communication mechanisms prioritizing the identified vulnerable groups with the highest exposure.

9.4. PHASE 4: PRICE AND PREFERENCE POINTS

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if (applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

General Conditions of Contract

1. Definitions	1.	The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
	1.1	"Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
:	1.2	"Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
:	1.3	"Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
	1.4	"Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
	1.5	"Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
:	1.6	"Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
:	1.7	"Day" means calendar day.
:	1.8	"Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
:	1.9	"Delivery ex stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
	1.10	"Delivery into consignees store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.

1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.

- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.

 - (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii)following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.
- 15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.
 - 15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.
 - 15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.
 - 15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.
 - 15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take

	16.3	Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
	16.4	Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.
17. Prices	17.1	Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.
18. Contract amendments	18.1	No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.
19. Assignment	19.1	The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.
20. Subcontracts	20.1	The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.
21. Delays in the supplier's performance	21.1	Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
	21.2	If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
	21.3	No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
	21.4	The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the

supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.

- 21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.
- 22. Penalties 22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.
 - ination23.1The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of
contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may
terminate this contract in whole or in part:
 - (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
 - (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
 - (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.
 - 23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.
 - 23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any

person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

- 23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.
- 23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:
 - (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
 - (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
 - (iii) the period of restriction; and
 - (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

- 23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.
- 24. Anti-dumping 24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anticountervailing and dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a duties and rights provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase.
